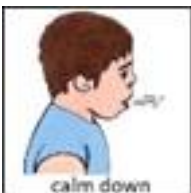

- I need to listen to the Police



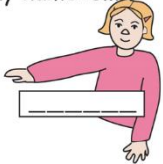
- I need to be calm and polite

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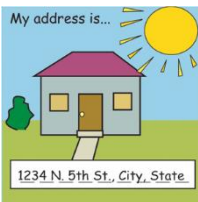
## It is OK to tell the Police
